STAGE 2 WATER SHORTAGE CONTINGENCY PLAN

As per City Code, watering times will change at the beginning of Daylight Savings Time to **two days per week**, based on street address. The City of Sacramento has adopted a <u>Stage 2 Water Shortage Contingency Plan</u>, which limits spring/summer watering to two days per week based on address.

Addresses Ending In	Watering Day	Watering Times
ODD number (1,3,5,7,or 9)	Tuesday and/or Saturday	Before 10 a.m. or after 7 p.m.
Even number (0,2,4,6,or 8)	Wednesday and/or Sunday	Before 10 a.m. or after 7 p.m.

Human Trafficking Awareness

Neighborhood Services Division continues to inform you about issues that have significant impact on our community. We would like you to be aware of human trafficking and have information regarding available resources.

Human trafficking is modern day slavery. According to the United States Government, "human trafficking" refers to the act of recruiting, harboring, transporting, providing, or obtaining a person for compelled labor or commercial




sex acts through the use of force, fraud, or coercion. In other words, it is the process of controlling a person with the intent to exploit them. While the term "trafficking" might imply some kind of movement, victims of human trafficking can be born into slavery or otherwise enslaved without having been transported anywhere

It is estimated that there are 35.8 million slaves in the world today. They are women. They are men. They are children. Modern day slaves can be found all over the world, including in every state in the U.S. In fact, it is also estimated that there are up to 300,000 children at risk of being trafficked in the United States alone.

RT has activated high voltage wires above the light rail tracks along the Blue Line to Cosumnes River College (CRC) light rail extension currently under construction. Stay clear of this high voltage area and the overhead wires, which are extremely dangerous!

RT will be operating light rail test trains between the Meadowview Station and the new Cosumnes River College Station starting later this month. Testing may take place at any time during the day or night, and will continue until the opening of the Blue Line to CRC light rail service in September 2015.

Pedestrians and bicyclists should be careful around the new light rail tracks. The public is reminded to adhere to the following safety rules:

- Stay alert and be aware of your surroundings when near tracks or in stations.
- Avoid the danger of distraction caused by cell phones, headphones or other electronic devices.
- Look and listen for trains. Light rail trains can travel at any time from either direction and are relatively query ter a train has passed, a second train might be traveling from the opposite direction.
- Whether on foot, bike or in a vehicle, it is illegal to go around moving or lowered crossing gates.
- It is prohibited to ride bicycles, skateboards or rollerblades in stations.
- Never use light rail tracks for walking, jogging or taking shortcuts.

Calvine Road Closure

South Sacramento Detour Routes - Full Road Closure on Calvine - Through Traffic Detour Routes on Power Inn Rd. - Through Traffic Detour Routes on Elk Grove-Florin Traffic affected between Power Inn Road and Elk Grove Florin Road

Calvine Road Closure & Traffic Restrictions at the Union Pacific Railroad Crossing

Starting Monday, May 18 at 7 a.m. until Wednesday, May 20 at 5 p.m., Calvine Road -- from Power Inn Road to Elk Grove Florin Road -- will be closed to through traffic. This closure has been requested by Union Pacific Railroad for urgent repairs needed for sections of railroad tracks.

- •The closure will impact all westbound and eastbound through traffic on Calvine Road -- between Power Inn Road & Elk Grove Florin Road -- including vehicles, pedestrians and bicycles.
- •The full closure of Calvine Road will only occur at the Union Pacific Railroad crossing between Barrymore Drive/Sheldon North Drive to Vintage Park Drive. Access for all property owners and residents will be maintained at all times.

Increased Travel Time & Detours: Through traffic is advised to avoid this area during the closure period as there will be significant impacts to all roadway users. Roadway users are advised to use alternative routes until project work is completed (see detour map on back). Detour signs and electronic message boards will be in place to alert motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists about the temporary road closure.

Construction Activities: Project work includes Union Pacific Railroad making urgent repairs to sections of railroad tracks. County maintenance crews will also repair adjacent sections of pavement on Calvine Road on the east and west sides of the railroad tracks.

Closure Period: Sacramento County and the City of Elk Grove understand the challenges and inconvenience that commuters, residents, businesses, bicyclists and pedestrians will experience during the closure period and ask for the public's patience and cooperation as we work to complete this project.

- Evidence of U.S. Citizenship, such as U.S. birth certificate (original or certified copy), naturalization certificate or previous passport
- Valid Photo Identification
- Passport photo, available for a fee at the City Clerk's Office or at stores such as Costco, Walgreens and Rite Aid
- Payment for fees due (fees are dependent on services needed)
 - One payment is due to the U.S. Department of State (must be CHECK or MONEY ORDER) and one payment is due to the City of Sacramento, payable by cash, check, or credit.

CONTINUING EXHIBITIONS

"Of Cottages and Castles: The Art of California Faience" February 22 through May 17, 2015

William Bragdon was a ceramic engineer trained at Alfred University in New York. He moved to Berkeley in 1915 to teach at the California School of Arts and Crafts and shortly thereafter formed a partnership with his Alfred University classmate Chauncey Thomas, then running a Berkeley pottery studio. Together they created decorative tiles, vases, and sculpture, calling their wares California Faience. The most prestigious of the company's projects came in the 1920s when architect Julia Morgan commissioned a complete environment of tiles for William Randolph Hearst's palatial home and grounds in San Simeon. The first exhibition on this subject, "Of Cottages and Castles" presents the full range of the company's accomplishments, with an emphasis on decorative pieces emblematic of Arts and Crafts, Art Deco, and Moderne styles, as well as tiles made for Hearst Castle.

"The Nature of William S. Rice: Arts and Crafts Painter and Printmaker" February 22 through May 17, 2015

This exhibition offers a rare glimpse into the private world of William S. Rice (1873–1963), an artist and naturalist known for his ability to distill nature to its simplest forms. Rice was a prolific painter of the California landscape but is today better known as a printmaker, one who authored two books on the process and executed every print himself. He applied the classic Japanese art of "ukiyo-e" (woodblock printing, or "pictures of the floating world") to images of the West, where he moved in 1900. This exhibition brings to light many of the artist's accomplishments, including several never-before-exhibited pieces, featuring both still lifes and the California landscape before development.

On behalf of the Respite Partnership Collaborative (RPC), Sierra Health Foundation: Center for Health Program Management is accepting applications for membership in the RPC.

The RPC is looking for members interested in mental health issues to contribute to the evaluation activities of the project, including the mental health respite programs, and the development of a plan to communicate about respite and efforts to sustain successful respite services.

The RPC is a community-driven body of dedicated volunteers working together on an innovative project that supports respite programs as a way to respond to mental health crisis in Sacramento County.

The RPC began in May 2012 to address mental health crisis by establishing respite options to help reduce the need for hospitalizations that could occur as a result of mental health crisis. The RPC has announced four rounds of funding. Through this funding, 10 organizations have received grant awards totaling \$5.25 million to provide mental health respite. In 2013-2014, 1,545 individuals received mental health respite in Sacramento County.

The RPC project is a partnership of selected community members, the County of Sacramento Division of Behavioral Health Services and Sierra Health Foundation: Center for Health Program Management. The RPC is funded through the Sacramento County Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) Innovation Component.
