Pride Month is a jubilant celebration full of parades, workshops, concerts, dances, parties and festivals. It is celebrated in countless cities all over the world, including countries where being LGBTQ+ is against the law. It is a time where the community stands together to be seen and heard where historically they had been pushed to the margins of society. Hence, the loud, colorful and sometimes outlandish crowds in attendance.





Stonewall Inn in New York City where a crowd of people in the LGBTQ+ community decided they had been pushed around too much by the NYC police and came together threw things and heckled them until reinforcements arrived. This was not the first act of protest for the community, but it was the first time the community realized the power they had when they stood together to stand up to the oppression and became the galvanizing event that sparked a new age in LGBTQ+ rights. The parade quickly spread across the country and into countries all over the world.



The Pride flag that we see today has a significant history as well. The design was originally commissioned by Harvey Milk, one of the first openly-gay elected officials in the US. In the original design, there were 8 colors, but two of them were difficult to manufacture, which lead to the 6 color-striped flag where each color represents its own unique symbolism. Red: life, Orange: healing, Yellow: Sunlight, Green: nature, Indigo: serenity, and Violet: spirit. Over the years, other colors have been added to celebrate the many different races and gender-identities of the LGBTQ+ community.

# Celebrated Figures

Harvey Milk - One of the first openly gay elected government officials in the US. Milk was elected to the San Francisco Board of Supervisors in 1977. He introduced, and successfully passed legislation that banned discrimination based on sexual orientation in employment, housing and public accommodation. Less than a year into his term, he was shot and killed by the conservative former City Supervisor, Dan White, who was also the only dissenting vote in the landmark legislation.

Barbara Gittings - Sometimes referred to as the "mother of the LGBT rights movement", Gittings was one of the founders of the first lesbian civil rights organization, Daughters of Bilitis, in 1958. Much of her focus was protesting the belief that homosexuality was something to be cured and played a pivotal role in convincing the American Psychiatric Association to remove homosexuality as a mental disorder in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual.





Gilbert Baker - The "creator" of the traditional Gay Pride flag. He was a renowned political activist and designer who grew up experiencing alienation and homophobia all his life. The Gilbert Baker Foundation's mission is "to educate future generations about the Rainbow Flag and to record and promote its impact on the world.

Storme DeLarverie - One of the protesters during the Stonewall Inn riots, she often insisted that the term "riot" was incorrect and insisted it was instead "an uprising, it was a civil rights disobedience - it wasn't no <expletive> riot". She performed as a "drag king" and inspired a movement that pushed for the acceptance of women to wear men's clothing as regular everyday wear. She also volunteered to patrol downtown Manhattan looking out for bullying, intolerance and discrimination.





Freddie Mercury - The famous lead singer for the rock band Queen. Freddie's flamboyant and electric persona helped propel him and his band into legendary status. Regardless of his sexual orientation, Freddie was and is beloved universally by people of all beliefs, backgrounds and cultures.

Ifti Nasim - A gay poet from Pakistan who fled his country to America in order to escape persecution for being gay. His Urdu book of poetry titles "Narman" is considered to be the first in the language to express gay desire. He was inducted into the Chicago Hall of Fame in 1996.
